



Porsche Torque Vectoring (PTV).

Optional Porsche Torque Vectoring, with variable torque distribution (vectoring) to rear wheels and mechanical rear axle differential lock, is now available for the Porsche 911 Turbo. The PTV system actively enhances driving dynamics and stability by responding to the steering angle and steering speed, accelerator position, yaw rate and overall speed. Essentially, PTV corrects steering behaviour and precision by applying targeted braking to the right or left rear wheel as required.

In practice, this means that during dynamic cornering, slight braking is applied to the rear wheel on the inside of the bend (1) as soon as the steering wheel is turned. This braking uses the rear axle differential (2) to distribute driving torque from the inside wheel to the outside wheel (3). As a result, the outside wheel has more power and delivers angular momentum (yawing movement) to the vehicle's vertical axis (4), supporting the steering angle and increasing steering dynamics. At low and medium speeds the system significantly

enhances vehicle agility and steering precision; at high speeds the system works in combination with the mechanical rear axle differential lock to add driving stability.

The new PTV system works best in combination with Porsche Traction Management (PTM) and Porsche Stability Management (PSM), providing unrivalled driving stability on a variety of road conditions including rain and snow. Because PTV enhances driving dynamics at all times, the system remains active during sporty circuit driving even when the PSM is deactivated.

As with any new 911 Turbo, efficiency was at the forefront of PTV design. Groundbreaking performance and driving stability have been achieved with minimal additional components. In other words, more driving fun – without more weight.

Performance Principles

Welcome to our first edition of *Performance Principles* with the Porsche Sport Driving School, where we take a few minutes to answer some of the more popular questions that our drivers have asked. In our first edition, we will be looking at the art of braking. Whether driving for sport or recreation, braking is an essential skill that must be mastered.

While driving my Porsche, how do I judge the correct safe distance from the car in front?

From Mr. Xu, Chengdu, China

The safest distance is determined by the speed at which we travel. In perfect conditions, an average car travelling at 50 km/h will take 25 metres to slow to zero. What most people do not realise, is that if you double this speed to 100 km/h, you will now require 100 metres to stop. When your speed doubles, your stopping distance quadruples! However, this still does not account for your own reaction time.

After seeing an obstruction ahead, the average person will take 0.8 seconds to react and move their foot to the brake pedal. On top of this, the average hydraulic braking system requires 0.2 seconds to apply pressure to the brake discs. This amounts to approximately one second of additional time before your car begins to slow down. During this time your car will travel an additional 14 metres if you are travelling at 50 km/h.

In total, our overall stopping distance at 50 km/h is 39 metres.

What does this mean? Because the car in front will also be moving in the same direction, you do not need the full 39 metres of space between you and the next car. However, as a minimum, you should allow 10 metres of space for every 20 km/h (1m : 2km/h). If travelling at 50 km/h you will need 25 metres between your car and the car in front. At 100 km/h you will need at least 50 metres of space.

In all Porsche models, a complex combination of advanced braking components and electronics are constantly working together to offer you safety. But despite all this, the onus still remains on you – the driver – to ensure that every Porsche journey remains a safe one.

- ⑤ Store luggage carefully and securely inside your vehicle, as loose objects may cause injury when dislodged during an emergency situation.
- ⑥ Consider Porsche Tequipment load-carrying accessories for larger quantities of luggage: tailored specifically to the dynamics of your Porsche, they ensure your driving performance is compromised as little as possible.

PCCA Hotly Contested in Indonesia Sepang Showdown looms on the horizon

The Porsche Carrera Cup Asia (PCCA) continued to delight motorsport fans on 16 August 2009, over two rounds of racing at Indonesia's Sentul International Circuit. A brace of fine performances in both classes of the one-make series ensured a thrilling finale to the 2009 season, scheduled for the Sepang International Circuit in Malaysia this coming December.

Christian Menzel of Team StarChase (Nanjing) benefited most from the day's racing, gaining valuable ground on overall championship leader Tim Sugden of GruppeM Racing (Qingdao). Menzel qualified in pole position for Round 7, but was unable to stop 22 year-old Rodolfo Avila of Asia Racing Team (Macau) from recording a second victory in an outstanding debut season. Avila gained an early lead from the start, and then impressively held off the advances of seasoned racers Menzel and Sugden, who took second and third place respectively.

However Menzel would not be denied in Round 8, as his Porsche 911 GT3 Cup surged to victory ahead of Avila and an unfortunate Sugden, who will be disappointed not to have extended his lead at the top of the leader board. Reigning champion Darryl O'Young of Team Jebesen (Hong Kong) could not break onto the podium in either round, leaving Sentul further behind his rivals.

With Sugden, Menzel and O'Young occupying the top three places on the leader board, and only races in Singapore, Shanghai and Sepang remaining, another triumph for Chinese teams in the Asia-wide series appears likely. With another exciting weekend of racing in Shanghai this November, no Porsche lover will want to miss a crucial chapter in determining the title winner in the 2009 series of the Porsche Carrera Cup Asia.

Motor Trend acknowledges Cayman as "Best Driver's Car"

US car journal *Motor Trend* has chosen the Porsche Cayman S as the "Best Driver's Car" of the year 2009. At virtually the same time, the Cayman was also picked by British car journal *Auto Express* as "Best Sports Car" in their New Car Awards 2009. In both cases Porsche's mid-engined coupé convinced the test experts with its driving dynamics, precision, feedback and response.

New Edition of the World's Most Successful Racing Car

Stronger, wider, faster – the new version of the Porsche 911 GT3 Cup has been unveiled and will now offer more performance and value than ever before. The successor to the best-selling racing car of all time, the new GT3 Cup will be built in a production run of more than 1,400 units. Based for the first time on the 911 GT3 RS, the newest Porsche racing car features reduced weight, 44 mm of additional width at the rear, and an increase in engine size of 0.2 l allowing the 3.8 l power unit to develop an incredible 450 bhp (331 kW).

Porsche triumphs in Nürburgring 24-Hour Race

For the fourth time in succession the drivers of the Manthey Racing Porsche team climbed to the top of the victory podium at the Nürburgring 24 Hour Race. In their Porsche 911 GT3 RSR, Timo Bernhard, Romain Dumas, Marc Lieb and Marcel Tiemann fought off fierce competition from the Audi R8 Team. Seven out of the top ten places were occupied by Porsche racing cars.

Class Victory for Porsche at Le Mans 24-Hour Race

The Porsche RS Spyder of the Danish team Essex dominated the LMP2 category at Le Mans. Porsche customers Caspar Elgaard and Kristian Poulson, plus racing driver Emmanuel Collard, controlled the entire race and finished with a comprehensive lead of 15 laps. The Essex team also won the prestigious environmental award, the "Michelin Green X Challenge" for the vehicle with the best overall efficiency (the ratio of completed laps to fuel consumption).
